

JPL Troop 509 Leadership Position Description

DEN CHIEF

GENERAL INFORMATION

Position: Appointed by the Scoutmaster

Term: 12 months (which qualifies for the Den Chief Service award)

Reports to: Scoutmaster and Den Leader

Role: Den chiefs work with Cub Scouts, Webelos Scouts, and den leaders in Cub Scout packs.

Comments: Den chiefs provide knowledge of games and scout skills that many Den Leaders lack. The den chief

is also a recruiter for the troop. This function is important because no troop can thrive without new

members and most will come from Cub Scouting.

QUALIFICATIONS

Age: 12 or older

Rank: Second Class rank or higher

Experience: None, but past service as patrol leader or assistant patrol leader is recommended

PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

Training: You must attend the Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops (ILST)

Attendance: You are expected to attend 90% of all den and pack meetings, 50% of all pack activities, 50% of all

troop meetings, 50% of all troop outings and 25% of all service projects. If your attendance is low, or if you have three unexcused absences in a row, you can be removed from office. You must

inform the den leader if you will be absent.

Effort: When you accept this position, you agree to provide service and leadership to the den and pack.

You are expected to give this job your best effort.

GENERAL LEADERSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES

Uniform: Set a good example by wearing your uniform correctly. Wear all of the parts of the troop uniform,

shirt tucked in, with all required badges in their correct locations.

Behavior: Set a good example by living the scout oath and law in your everyday life. Show scout spirit in

everything you say and do.

Attendance: Set a good example by being an active scout. Be on time for meetings and activities. You must

contact the den leader if you are not going to be at a meeting or if you have to miss an activity.

SPECIFIC LEADERSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES

- Set a GOOD EXAMPLE (the most powerful form of leadership)
- Receive den chief training and know the purposes of Cub Scouting
- Meet with adult members of the den, pack and troop as necessary to discuss your role and responsibilities to the den and pack
- Help at weekly den meetings and monthly pack meetings
- Assist with den meeting activities (songs, skits, games and sporting activities)
- Help Cub Scouts achieve the purposes of scouting
- Be a friend to the scouts in the den
- Encourage Cub Scouts to bridge to a troop
